CHAPTER I

EUROPEAN NATIONAL CITIZENSHIP



« One who, being born to two citizen parents is a citizen.»

The **European citizenship**, defined at its foundation by the application of convergence criteria [in order not to have to take account of the weak policy by the erstwhile European states thereupon], will only be granted through the application of the patrilineal and matrilineal *jus sanguinis* principle.



Citizen's wage [Equivalent to the Athenian misthos]

Every European citizen will receive a particular wage [which will be reassessed every year by the European Assembly]. In return, he shall participate in the vote at all elections.



Imperative term

Each would-be candidate shall imperatively, once elected (at any election), stands by five of his electoral commitments at the risk of being automatically dismissed from his post.



Citizen exclusiveness.

Every citizen will enjoy exclusive rights in exchange for exclusive duties too (like the citizen Service). In addition to the voting right, this will concern the land ownership rights, all sorts of social benefits, access to civil service examination and to any other fields which will be reserved to the citizens.



Citizen marriage

Marriage is the union of a man and a woman, both citizens, in conformity with the European laws. A civil pact with limited advantages will be put in place for other specific cases.



Castle doctrine.

Each citizen's abode is his sanctuary. He shall have the absolute right to possess and protect it by any means deemed to be in conformity with the law.



Citizen Service.

At the end of a military training included in the educational background of High-school students, every citizen shall effect regular refresher courses. Each citizen shall compulsorily have a weapon according to a standard defined by the State. [Swiss model]



Taxe residence.

Any person not possessing European citizenship and residing lawfully in Europe for a longer period of one month shall pay a tax residence.



Civil liberties.

Each citizen enjoys absolute protection of his freedom of thought and speech. Only public slander towards a third party may be actionable [1st amendment].



Magistrate election.

In order to ensure judicial independence in comparison to the executive power, prosecutors, judges and police chiefs will be elected by the citizens. The eligibility will be subjected to a tough examination of proficiency along with the possession of proper state-registered diplomas.



Passing laws.

Citizens will be more involved in (relative) direct democracy. Restrictive popular referendums will be organised. Fundamental laws shall systematically be put to a referendum. The introduction of an unforgeable voter registration card and the setting up of voting machines will moreover contribute to it.



Citizen's Jury.

Juries composed of randomly selected citizens will be put in place. They shall be entitled to take decisions regarding special cases, like the granting of European citizenship in accordance with the legal provisions.



CHAPTER II

EUROPEANS INSTITUTIONS.



Constituent Assembly.

The European Parliament in Strasbourg will proclaim itself European Constituent Assembly and will appoint a European interim government in charge of writing a European Constitution whose the final version shall be put to the vote through a continental Referendum that it (the European government) will have to oversee the smooth running of it.



Assembly: Electoral system.

The European Assembly will be elected by **direct universal suffrage** with a **party-list proportional representation system starting from 0.2% of the votes**. Citizens will be able to remove names on the list for which they will vote.



Senate of regions.

A Senate elected by constituency in a single-round voting system will represent the regional and/or national identities at European level.



European President.

The European President will be elected every four years by **direct universal suffrage**, he will be in charge of ruling the government designated by the majority. He will be the commander-in-chief of the European army.



Moneta Europaea.

The euro (€) will be kept and will become the national currency of Europe. The European Central Bank will be directly placed under the aegis of the European Treasury department.



Capital.

The **capital of Europe** will be Strasbourg, while waiting for a potential European capital to be built in Central Europe with the prospect of a future accession of Russia.



National flag.

The **current EU flag**, with a circle of 12 golden stars on a blue background will become the **national flag of Europe**. It will be symbolically purified during the United Europe foundation.



Republic.

Europe will be a Republic and will have its own State, named EUROPE, or European Unitary State (EUS).



Official languages.

Europe will have 7 **official languages** (English, French, German, Spanish, Italian, Polish and Russian) with the prospect of a unitary language. *the **europaiom** (="modern" Indo-European).



Regional languages.

All European native languages will be preserved. They will compulsorily be taught from school in the concerned regions.



Spiritual heritage and Tradition.

Europe will give its rightful place to its Pagan, Christian and humanist heritage, along with other long-standing integrated religious inputs, nevertheless in minority.



Geographical area.

The geographical area of Europe at its foundation, will be the one of the former European Union. An immediate broadening process to the whole continent, including Russia, will begin. Turkey and Azerbaijan will be excluded from this group.



CHAPTER III

DEFENSE.



N.A. T.O.

The North Atlantic Treaty Organisation will be null and void. N.A.T.O. shall not have any hold on European jurisdiction anymore.



U.S. military bases.

All American military bases on European soil shall be **dismantled**, defence bases as well as intelligence bases.



European army.

Creation of a **European army** divided into national and/or linguistic legions whose the number will depend on the population of the European nations, or the number of speakers. Creation of **European Special Forces** units, gathering elite corps of the former States.



Strategic languages.

The Integrated Command of the European army will use **English**, **French** and **German**, added to this, **Russian**, as soon as Russia joins the United Europe.



Intelligence.

Creation of a European Intelligence Service. (Intelligence European agency)



Military nuclear.

Pooling of Franco-British nuclear weapons, then extended to Russia's ones.



Unique veto.

Merger of French, British and Russian vetos at the U.N. Security Council.



Permanent veto.

Establishment of a **permanent veto at the U.N. Security Council**. Thereafter, put an end to its (European) financing, and move all its other bodies (U.N.E.S.C.O., U.N.I.C.E.F., W.H.O., W.T.O.) (at present) established in Europe.



European corps of border guards.

Border protection will be ensured by corps of border guards with a military status named **European Police Force**, equipped with sensing means (drones, laser sensors, and so on) for border surveillance.



Cyprus.

Bring the illegal occupation of Northern Cyprus by Turkey to a close (Occupied since 1974).



Civil guard.

Creation of a Civil Guard or "European Guard" composed of volunteer citizens.



Military budget.

3% of the European budget shall be allocated for defence matters.



CHAPTER IV

EDUCATION, TRAINING.



University.

Introduction of a competitive entrance examination in university with *numerus clausus* (restricted intake). Hence, free tuition fees.



Professional trainings.

Encourage vocational education as a viable alternative to general education at the end of middle and high school.



Languages.

Compulsory learning of a foreign language amongst the seven official languages (Cf. II-09). Eventually, compulsory learning of the European unitary language.



Regionality.

Compulsory learning of the regional language in the concerned euro-region.



Classical languages.

Strong encouragement to study classical languages such as Greek, Latin and optionally Sanskrit.



History.

History curriculum **fully euro-focused**. **Greece** and **Rome** will be the subject of an entire year of teaching specific to each. A year will be devoted to other Indo-European peoples as well. Mythology will be taught within this scope.



Geography.

Geography curriculum greatly **euro-focused**. Only one single year will be devoted to the rest of the world and notably to ethno-civilizational problematics along with geopolitics at large.



Sciences.

Mathematics and Physics teachings will be merged. Technical terminology will be standardised. On the other hand, chemistry and nuclear physics teachings will be separate.



Sports.

Integration of sports in high school with a military dimension, both for young men and women. "A sound mind in a sound body" principle. Nutrition and deportment lessons will be given and combined to this teaching.



Citizenship.

Civics and public morality lessons will be put in place.



Assessment.

Rating system for students will be maintained. A bonus for the worthiest students will be paid.



Grammar.

Intensive grammar courses taught in a consistent way throughout Europe, as well as spelling lessons, will replace the study of literature in middle school.



CHAPTER V

JUSTICE.



Capital punishment.

Launch of a **debate** upon death penalty followed by a **European referendum**. The executive will adopt a neutral stance in order not to influence the result.



Life sentence.

Establishment of a life sentence for the most heinous crimes.



Cumulative sentencing and financial impact.

A **sensible cumulative sentencing** system will be instituted for the most heinous crimes. Reserve the associated fines such as damages and the repayment of amounts unduly received for prison.



Penal code.

Establishment of a penal code consistent throughout Europe.



Court of Justice.

Transformation of the European Court of Justice into a European Court of Appeal. It will also be charged with combating political corruption.



Appeal.

Launch of a debate upon the appeal procedure principle followed by a European referendum.



Freedom of speech.

Associations shall not be able to take legal action against private individuals in the area of freedom of expression. Only slander towards a legal entity or a natural person may be sued.



Citizenship.

Only holders of European citizenship will be able to bring before administrative courts.



Jury.

The jury will not only give a verdict, it will also partake of deciding the punishment and will be the only one entitled to give a possible early release.



Charter of rights and duties.

A charter of rights and duties of the European citizen will be instituted. It will be indicative and non-binding.



Legal subsidiarity.

Subsidiary entities (town, euro-region and/or -nation) will be able to decide freely on specific regulations as long as these don't involve prison terms.



International Law.

The European state will not recognise international jurisdictions, and therefore their past or present decisions.



CHAPTER VI

AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL AREAS.



Slaughter and respect of the animal.

Animals shall be slaughtered in compliance with the **traditional European method of slaughter**, to wit, the prior stunning of animals and their killing with the surprise effect in a stressless context. **Transporting animals shall be prohibited over long journeys**.



Wild animals.

Protection of animals and encouragement of predators' expansion along with other endangered traditional animals of Europe such as wolves, bears, lynxes, eagles, Eurasian eagle-owls, Hermann's tortoises, European tree frogs, and so on.



Biodiversity of European ecosystems.

European plan of action against (imported) invasive species (Asian hornets, Red-eared sliders, and so on). Importing and/or possessing non-European animal species will be prohibited.



Reforestation plan.

Reforestation plan of Europe and the creation of protected wild areas as well as a harmonious geographical breakdown on the European continent.



Protectionism.

Implementation of a **European agricultural protectionism** in order to encourage the import of products which can be grown in Europe.



Local agriculture.

Implementation of mechanisms favouring the development of cultivated and farming areas in various places, so as to **favour short distribution channels** and ensure a permanent supply along with a proper health partitioning system.



Aid.

Compensatory aid will be instituted for farmers producing in difficult areas (Mountain...). The public service task will be duty remunerated for farmers and breeders for the protection of cultivated areas such as stretches of waters and forests, within the scope of a European action plan against the pollution of green spaces.



Common agricultural Policy (C.A.P.).

No restrictive common rules apart from health and safety standards, notably rules linked to subsidies like in the current system of the CAP. The objective is for famers to be able to make a living from their work **without owing it to subsidies**, in accordance with the lands' identity.



Traceability.

Labelling showing clearly and visibly the origin and the product composition along with intermediary organisations' name and the purchase price allocation shared between both the producer and the distributor.



Trusts.

Law on the dismantling of European agrifood trusts and/or with an international finance capitals, in favour of human-scale local and/or regional cooperatives.



Greenhouse farms.

Encouragement to create agricultural greenhouses (hydroponic or not) in order to product exotic foodstuffs requiring a suitable climate.



G.M.O.

Moratorium on G.M.O. prohibiting their use outside areas geographically very demarcated and exclusively designed for research.



CHAPTER VII

RELIGIONS AND CULTURE.



Traditional religions.

Recognition of Europe's indigenous Paganisms and Christianities as traditional religions along with Judaism owing to its long existence in Europe. Islam will be recognised in the same way but only in areas where the Muslim tradition is historically established (in The Balkans, Caucasia and the Autonomous Republics of Russia).



Clergy.

Priests of traditional religions will be sworn in and remunerated by the European State. Their payment as well as the maintenance of places of worship will be financed by a German-style European tax, declared by each citizen.



Vatican.

The Lateran treaty (1929) will be null and void, thus, end of Papal statute. A new concordat between the European State and the Vatican will be established. The Pope will be asked to refrain from taking any stance of a political nature regarding the functioning of Europe.



Hagia Sophia.

The European government will demand that Turkey doesn't turn Hagia Sophia (currently a museum) into a mosque.



Religious traditions.

Religious traditions (Polygamy...) contrary to fundamental European values shall be prohibited on European Soil. Any discrimination based on religious principles shall be proscribed. An anti-sect action plan will be as well put in place about the notion of abuse of vulnerable person.



Religious marriage.

Religious marriage, in the case of traditional religions, will have the legal validity if it is conform to the common legal rule.



European celebrations.

December 25th (Catholic Christmas) and January 6th (Orthodox Christmas) will become bank holidays, as well as January 1st, April 21st, May 1st, June 21st, November 1st and December 21st.



Commemorations.

May 9 and November 11 will become bank holidays and commemoration days. The former as Europe Unity day and the latter as a homage to European combatants (All camps and conflicts taken together). May 8 will be abandoned.



Renovation plan.

A great European renovation and/or reconditioning plan of the most emblematic sites of the European civilisation will be put in place. The works of art kept in museums will be given back to their original building, e.g., The Athenian Parthenon. It will be possible to practise the religion anew in renovated antique temples.



Museums.

Free pass to museums for holders of European citizenship.



International Sports.

Euro-focused overhaul of the Olympic Games. They will take place every 4 years in Greece and will be reserved for Europeans athletes. Ancient sports will be brought up to date. The Winter Olympic Games renamed *The Asgardian Games* will unfold systematically in Europe and will be reserved too.



Championships.

European championships (all sports taken together) will only comprise strictly European countries. For instance, Turkey will not be part of these. Recruiting foreign players will be proscribed for all tournaments.



CHAPTER VIII

EUROPEAN FOREIGN POLICIES.



Decolonisation.

Implementation of the final decolonisation and withdrawal process of Europe regarding its former colonies. Put an end to "la Françafrique" (France's relationships with its former colonies in Africa) and the Commonwealth. Independence of Europe's last overseas territories (Overseas France et al.).



Embassies and proxenies.

Loss of the extraterritorial status of embassies in Europe. Embassies will be substituted for **proxenies**. A proxeny, under the leadership of a proxenos (necessarily a holder of European citizenship) will be assigned (on European soil) with assisting foreign citizens (e.g. tourism).



European minorities.

The European State will come to "European minorities" defence abroad, for instance, in Kazakhstan (35% of Europeans), in South Africa (Afrikaners), in Zimbabwe, in Venezuela and in Bolivia.



Iran.

Support for **pan-Iranian nationalists** and to all those who esteem our common Indo-European past, within that framework, for the **Kurdish and the Balochi causes**, with the wish to establish a partnership between Europe and Iran on condition that a sweeping Regime change occurs.



India.

Support for Indian nationalists and for contemporary India's will to revive its ties with its Iong memory, and notably with its Indo-European past which both Europe and India share. Implementation of a partnership between Europe and India, especially faced with Pakistan and China.



Turkey.

New diplomatic direction of Europe towards Turkey. Absolute defence of European interests in Cyprus, the Aegean islands and Thrace. Implicit support for the Kemalist opposition faced with a supposedly "moderate" Islamism. Refusal of any political accession of Turkey to Europe.



E.U./U.S.A. trade agreements.

Termination of E.U./U.S.A. trade agreements, notably the T.T.I.P, if it had to come into effect. Application of an "economic equality" principle regarding trade.



European identity outside Europe.

Support for any identity reassertion policy of a European nature in the U.S.A. and in the former European settlement colonies (Canada, Australia, New-Zealand, and Argentina).



Islamic world.

Support to the secular Arab resistance faced with Islamism, defence of Arab Christians in the Near East.



Oil monarchies.

Termination of agreements and other privileged (diplomatic) relations between Europe and oil monarchies in the Gulf. **Prohibition of any Islamic financing from those countries** (especially in favour of religious implantations in Europe).



China.

Economic protection policy of Europe through a **strong protectionism** against China and notably by the **application of rigorous ecological and social standards**. Compensatory economic partnership agreement with Japan.



Arctic zone.

Refusal of any Greenland independence. Establishment of the status of an autonomous Republic. Historical reminder of the medieval Icelandic colonisation.



CHAPTER IX

FINANCE AND SOCIAL WELFARE.



IX-01

Taxes.

Taxes and duties will be divided up between the European state and the euro-regions and/or euro-nations in accordance with variable modalities depending on their specific characters.



IX-02

European V.A.T.

Creation of a value added tax on the consumption. It may vary according to the euro-regions and/or euro-nations during a transitional period in readiness for a controlled harmonisation.



Income tax.

A European income tax will apply to families as from the first euro beyond the citizen's wage (Naturally tax-free). This tax will be progressive, with a rate ranging from 5% to 35%.



Council tax.

Creation of a single property tax, which will only take account of the attractiveness of the area and the surface occupied, beyond a minimum value per person.



Minimum wage.

A guaranteed and untaxed minimum wage will be applied, adjusted during an adjustment period according to the euro regions and/or nations. Moreover, salaries will be capped per profession in such way as to avoid wage gaps.



Inheritance.

Removal of inheritance taxes, in favour of direct heirs of the first generation.



Single contract.

A European labour code, based on a type of a single contract, offering guarantees strengthening according to its seniority, will be applicable to the private sector.



European birth rate and family wage.

A European plan to revitalise the birth rate will be put in place with the goal of creating the conditions of fulfilment for parenthood to achieve a rate of 2/3 children per woman. Within this framework, a family wage will be granted to citizen families according to the number of children, without prerequisites. Nurseries will be put in place at workplaces to promote the European demographics.



Retirement.

The legal retirement age will be postponed given the prolongation of life expectancy but it will adjusted. Actually, retirement will be progressive, the career will end with part-time work, devoted in particular to the training of young working persons.



Free education and healthcare.

Education and healthcare will be free. The education will remain free in a scope defined by the concerned ministry. Access to healthcare will only be worth beyond a symbolic copayment designed for preventing abuses and will be limited to authorised operations.



Unemployment.

Implementation of a "flexicurity", combining unemployment benefits and training, reserved for European citizens.



Social welfares.

Apart from the citizen's wage, unemployment benefits and the family wage, no welfare will be granted.



CHAPTER X

ECONOMICS.



Public sector.

The public sector will refocused on essential fields, especially sovereign functions (regalian), to wit, public administration, diplomacy, army, justice, police, energy policy, infrastructure management and environmental policies.



Public education.

The share of public expenditures on education will be reduced and limited to primary school (5 to 11 years old), to secondary school, excluding apprenticeship, to selective universities and to a single scientific research body.



Health.

The share of public expenditures on health will be reduced and limited to major surgical operations in hospitals and to large health programmes. General medicine will be practised in small integrated medical centres having diagnostic capacity, these will be strictly controled. Common surgeries will be performed in clinics, while encouraging ambulatory surgery.



Private.

Generally, public service tasks may be entrusted to private bodies, in accordance with specifications whose the definition and the proper monitoring will be incumbent upon the concerned ministry.



European market.

The European market will be open, besides European companies, to foreign companies possessing an accreditation given by the State, state-to-state negotiated. They will be subject to a specific tax.



Stock exchange.

Only European companies will be listed on the European stock exchange. Shares will be owned only by European citizens.



Competition.

A free and undistorted competition will be the standard in the European area, in compliance with common rules within the scope of a European wage harmonisation. Antitrust laws will be put in place, prohibiting especially industries to be in control of information medias.



Sustainability and cost of energy.

Encouragement to produce modular, fixable and assessable objects, by introducing a V.A.T. exemption according to the nature of the object. Businesses and private individuals will be charged for the energy on the basis of the actual cost of production, integrating the energy cost of the implementation and the maintenance of the means of production.



Employment.

Employment of non-citizen staffs will be an exceptional case and shall be submitted for validation by a jury. The employer will be subject to a specific tax.



Profits.

Companies will be taxed on profits they will have made and on acquisitions they will have proceeded, with the exception of European employee wages and of investments designed for research, development or production.



Cost of pollution.

The cost of pollution, allowed as it is inevitable, will be charged to the commercial sector.



Travel cost.

Travel cost will be adjusted, taking account of the actual cost, including the infrastructure maintenance and the environmental impact.



CHAPTER XI

ENERGY, PRODUCTION, AND ECONOMY.



Production.

Energy production will be diversified, but priority shall be given to more efficient forms of energy. Generation IV reactors (fission) will be built and a waste reprocessing plan of previous nuclear power plant generations will begin.



Fusion.

This priority will enter into a long-term perspective concerning investments. For instance, nuclear fusion will be greatly financed in readiness for an accelerated exploitation.



Other energies.

Phasing out of intermittent energy production systems inaccurately described as "renewable".



Nuclear safety.

Nuclear power stations and other risky plants will be set up in safe, non-seismic and flood-prone areas, especially in the Great European plain, even if it means revamping some current facilities. No power station shall be built in Italy, in the Balkans or in Iceland.



Resources.

Mining resources as well as other resources will be the property of the European State. However, a compensation will be granted to regions where resources are extracted, which may result in more industrial investments, especially those who will be able to use these resources.



Oil and mineral.

Oil and mineral purchase outside Europe will be done from countries which are regarded as strategic allies. The exploitation of the Arctic subsoil and of Siberia will limit those foreign purchases. The exploration of European areas with a high content of oil and natural gas will be encouraged. (e.g., the sea-bed around Cyprus and Albania).



Goods transport.

Concerning big and voluminous commodities in relation to their price, short distribution channels will be favoured by introducing taxes on heavy goods vehicles.



Sustainability and cost of energy.

Encouragement to produce modular, fixable and assessable objects, by introducing a V.A.T. exemption according to the nature of the object. Businesses and private individuals will be charged for the energy on the basis of the actual cost of production, integrating the energy cost of the implementation and the maintenance of the means of production.



Energies of Europe.

Creation of a European civil service of Energy.



Electric car.

The purchase of electric cars will only be helped inasmuch as there is a benefit, once the battery problems dealt with. The implementation of floor-rail personal electric cars will be seriously studied.



Vehicles.

Fuel-efficient, less-polluting and limited-speed vehicles will be designed to driving without license on constructed lanes without impacting traffic flow.



Compensation.

A clearing fund will, however, be put in place so as to combat desertification of some areas due to climatic conditions and the geographical location.



CHAPTER XII

INFORMATION AND MASS MEDIA.



Voter registration card.

European citizens will have a smart voter registration card, usable at all elections or at passing laws (not all), whether they are European, regional or local laws.



Committees.

On a certain number of themes at European level as well as intermediate levels, an electronic voting will be proposed to appoint and renew amongst the candidates some committees in charge of the concerned missions. Their financial means will be proportional to the number of votes obtained.



Electronic referendum.

Referendums using electronic voting will be widespread.



News.

Diversity of news in usual slots and in all-news channels as well as diversity of guests (politically speaking) in television debates will be guaranteed by creating editorial committees designated in accordance with the model described in XII-O2.



Cine-Europa.

Creation of a European cinema platform to compete with Hollywood. Encouragement to shoot epic movies inspired by the European tradition. Euro-American actors will be able to settle in Europe.



Aid for creation.

Aid for cinema and theatre consisting in advance on earnings, will be put in place through selection committees (cf. XII-O2).



Architecture.

Big architectural achievements will be directly submitted for opinion to citizens in accordance with the model described in XII-O3.



Heritage.

The maintenance, the reconstruction or even the extension of the typically European heritage will be a priority for public investment, as well as the heritage of its subsidiary components. Their planning will be decided by elected bodies. Neo-neoclassical (21st century neo-classic) will be greatly encouraged for new buildings. Hence, the European heritage will comprise architecture, fine arts, but also music, opera and theatre.



Art companies.

To keep this heritage alive, Music and theatre companies will be able to pay full-time players, singers or actors from public funds or through patronage.



Public aid.

Outside of this scope and of potential advances, there will not be any public aid for artistic creation.



Open but self-assured culture.

Culture will remain open to the world, but within the framework of the European/national/regional action, inviting foreign artists and troupes will only be reserved for the most emblematic/talented representatives. Their work shall nevertheless be compatible with policies promoted in Europe.



Production abroad.

European artists and troupes will be able to perform abroad, preferably in countries which share the European culture.
